SPAWNED AT SIFF: GAY-THEMED FILM FINDS SURPRISING HOME AT CHURCHES FROM OKLAHOMA TO SEATTLE

Congregations Screen the Film in Advance of Cinerama Premiere and Two-Week Run at the Uptown Theatre

(SEATTLE) Fresh on the hills of a successful run in the festival circuit, starting with a premiere at SIFF, Seattle filmmaker Drew Emery's award-winning documentary, **Inlaws & Outlaws,** gears up for the red-carpet treatment at **the Cinerama, Thursday, June 14**th —

followed by an exclusive two-week engagement at the **Uptown Theatre** in Queen Anne, beginning June 15th — just in time for Pride season.

Leading into this theatrical run, however, is an unusual alliance between the filmmaker and the progressive religious community — namely in the Religious Coalition for Equality (RCE) and member churches of the Reconciling Ministries Network (RMN). Just this past Saturday, the Ravenna United Methodist Church pulled out all the stops to host a screening of the film for their congregation and neighbors. "I thought this would be a great way for us to spread the word that our congregation is welcoming to all people, regardless of sexual orientation," says Pastor Dan Shelly. "We ended up having a great movie night and a terrific discussion with the filmmaker afterwards." Proceeds from that screening benefit the church's outreach program for at-risk youth.

The next two screenings are hosted by the Religious Coalition for Equality (RCE), an interfaith association of lay persons and clergy committed to educating and advocating for marriage equality for all couples and civil rights for all. RCE has set an goal of bringing **Inlaws**& Outlaws to at least <u>fifty</u> congregations across Washington state this year.

On May 18th, the University Congregational UCC (4515 – 16th Avenue NE in Seattle's University District) will kick off this grassroots campaign by hosting a screening for both church members and the community at large. Drew Emery, the film's director, will be in attendance at the 7 pm event and will conduct a question and answer session after the film. A suggested donation of \$5 is requested with all proceeds going to RCE.

On Saturday, May 19th, 7 pm, a second church screening will be held at Seattle First Baptist Church (1111 Harvard Avenue on Seattle's First Hill). This screening will also feature the film's director as well as two key subjects of the film, Pete-e Petersen and Jane Abbott Lighty. Petersen and Lighty were married at Seattle First Baptist a year and a half ago.

The partnership with RCE is a preview of the film's **Hearts + Minds Campaign**, which empowers local congregations, non-profits, schools and individual activists or film enthusiasts to host screenings of the film in their community. In Washington state alone, there are screenings slated in the coming months in Port Townsend, Vancouver and Bellingham. And in Indiana, in the heart of the Bible Belt, a local progressive network of churches is planning a statewide tour of the film throughout the summer.

"We've have found tremendous audiences for this film in progressive congregations," explains Drew Emery, the film's director. "That's the story of this film. The media would have us believe that gay and straight folk are irreconcilably at odds on so-called "lifestyle" issues — and they would have us believe that gay folks and religion are like oil and water. But my own

preconceptions were challenged when churches started coming to me and, sight unseen, requested the film."

Inlaws & Outlaws premiered at the Seattle International Film Festival in 2005 and then captured Best of Fest at the Palms Springs International Film Festival and the Grand Jury Award at the deadCENTER Film Festival.

The film's success is owed in great part to it's ability to get past all the divisive rhetoric on gay marriage to look at **real relationships**, gay and straight, and capture the heart of the matter: **it's about love**. By weaving together a series of refreshingly honest true stories from couples and singles, divorced and widowed, **Inlaws & Outlaws** takes a humorous and wideangled look at what it takes to find a mate — and keep them. At the top of the film, you don't know who's gay or straight and who's coupled with whom. By the end, you won't care and you'll be rooting for them all.
